CHOOSING CHILDREN'S BOOKS

Much of the pleasure of a good book comes from hearing a familiar voice read it and sitting in a warm and snugly place while sharing it. A "book" to your child can be a book on loan from the library; or it can be a discarded catalog, the junk mail, or an adult book with appealing pictures. Books are windows to the world. Children enjoy and read books for the same reasons adults do—for entertainment and excitement, for information and to gain skills.

PICTURE BOOKS

Books by these authors are good enough to read over and over again.

- <u>Peek A Boo</u>, by Janet & Allen Alberg A baby catalog of everyday life.
- Just Like Daddy, by Frank Asch

Getting up and doing everything "just like Daddy" is fine but catching a big fish "just like Mommy" is even better.

<u>Runaway Bunny</u>, by Margaret Wise Brown A little bunny wants to run away from home but his mother can always find him.

Mr. Grumpy's Motor Car, by John Burningham

Mr. Grumpy and his familiar friends fun into trouble motoring in heavy rains.

- <u>Very Hungry Caterpillar</u>, by Eric Carle The very hungry caterpillar eats his way through the pages of this book.
- <u>Freight Train</u>, by Donald Crews Clear, bright, simple illustrations show all the cars in the train.

<u>Tomie De Paola's Mother Goose</u>, by Tomie De Paola Crispy, outlined, brightly colored illustrations decorate and interpret a varied gathering of nursery rhymes.

- <u>Corduroy</u>, by Don Freeman The adventures of a teddy bear in a large department store.
- <u>Where's Spot?</u>, by Eric Hill Where is the puppy hiding? Open all the doors and find out.
- An Evening At Alfie's, by Shirley Hughes

On the night Alfie's Mum and Dad step out, a pipe bursts, wet chaos ensues, a young boy and his babysitter are left with the mess.
